## **Training**

Training has always been important, not only in developing new officers but also honing the skills of seasoned veterans. As with many things this year, most training could not be conducted due to Covid-19 issues except for those areas that was mandated by the state such as recertification on the BAC Verifier which conducts blood alcohol testing by breath as well as LEADS which is the state-run system to permit the search of driver and vehicle information. Throughout the year we have steadily updated our policy and procedure manual in order to be in compliance with the most recent federal and state mandates.

In addition, our training was supplemented by PoliceOne Academy. PoliceOne Academy is an online source the provides a wide variety of training topics that enhance officers' skills and knowledge. Each member of the full-time staff completed the following courses:

Part Time Officer Travis Wyczalek resigned this year. We are continuing to search for someone to replace him.

#### **Incidents For 2021**

In 2021 officers of the Monroeville Police Department responded to or initiated 2,044 incidents. This represents an increase of approximately 34.74% over 2020 when officers responded to or initiated approximately 1,517 incidents. This decline is linked to the implementation of Covid-19 protocols that required our officers to limit their contact with the public. Also, citizens were less mobile, staying home more often resulting in a 50% drop in reported vehicle accidents. A detail listing of those incidents is attached to this report.

#### **Photo Enforcement**

During 2021 approximately 699 complaints were issued for red light violations and 2,061 for speeding violations for a total of 2,76 complaints. This is an increase compared to 2020 when approximately 1,840 complaints were issued. The average speed violation was approximately 14.69 miles per hour over the posted speed limit. The most flagrant speed violation was 29 miles per hour over the posted speed limit or 53 miles per hour in a posted 25 zone.

The average red-light violation was approximately 2.69 seconds. This means the light was red for 2.69 seconds when the vehicle crossed the stop bar prior to entering the intersection. The most flagrant violation was 33.7 seconds.

To be considered a red-light violation, the vehicle must have crossed the stop bar after the traffic light has turned red. The stop bar is the very wide white line that is located next to the crosswalk lines, furthest from the intersection. It is not considered a red-light violation if the vehicle is in the intersection when the light turns red. For example, a vehicle stopped in traffic, inside the intersection, to make a left turn would not be considered a red-light violation. Unless there is signage prohibiting, vehicles are permitted to make a right turn on red provided they come to a complete stop first before proceeding safely with the turn.

Speed violations are recorded when a vehicle reaches a speed of 12 mph or higher in a non-school zone area. In school zones a vehicle must be going 10 mph or higher to receive a notice of liability.

#### **Traffic Accidents**

The number of vehicle accidents continue to decline in the Village. This year there were 19 total accidents compared with 23 in 2020 and 37 in 2019. Please see the attached maps for a general view as well as close up views.

## Norwalk Municipal Court-Fines

In 2021 Norwalk Municipal Court assessed \$19,716 in traffic fines as compared to \$17,667 in 2020. In 2021 \$7,920 in fines were assessed for criminal cases as compared to \$3,145 in 2020. Fines for Failure to File Village Income Tax are included in the criminal fine total.


### **Safety Town**






