2022 saw many changes at the Monroeville Police Department. Changes in personnel, changes in equipment and changes in how we conduct the business of keeping the citizens of Monroeville Safe while achieving the highest degree of professionalism.

Training

Training has always been important, not only in developing new officers but also honing the skills of seasoned veterans. As with many things this year, most training could not be conducted due to Covid-19 issues except for those areas that was mandated by the state such as recertification on the BAC Verifier which conducts blood alcohol testing by breath as well as LEADS which is the state-run system to permit the search of driver and vehicle information. Throughout the year we have steadily updated our policy and procedure manual in order to be in compliance with the most recent federal and state mandates.

All police department officers are required to complete at least 24 hours of Continuing Professional Training (CPT). They include the following topics and hours:

Cultural Humility; Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity; Responding to Mental Health; Use of Force; Legal Updates; Officer Personal Wellness; Responding to Sexual Assaults; Domestic Violence; Law Enforcement Response to Mass Protests/Demonstrations; Standards for Law Enforcement Vehicular Pursuit; Investigation of Employee Misconduct; Bias-Free Policing; Body-Worn Cameras; Use of Deadly Force; Community Engagement

Personnel

Officer Jordan Hanuscin resigned in October to take a position with the Sheffield Village Police Department. Gerald Broeckel was hired to fill a vacant part time position.

Incidents For 2022

In 2022 officers of the Monroeville Police Department responded to or initiated 1,965 incidents. This represents a drop of approximately 4.01% over 2021 when officers responded to or initiated approximately 2,044 incidents. Some of this decline is due to the loss of Officer Hanuscin that resulted in the department being down one full-time officer. A detailed listing of those incidents is attached to this report.

Photo Enforcement

During 2022 approximately 1,242 complaints were issued for red light violations and 6,198 for speeding violations for a total of 7,440 complaints. This is a substantial increase compared to 2021 when approximately 2,760 complaints were issued. Several things factored into this increase. This included operating nearly the entire year without interruption and the addition of speed cameras on North Street and the 300 Block of East Monroe.

The average speed violation was approximately 14.726 miles per hour over the posted speed limit. The most flagrant speed violation was 49 miles per hour over the posted speed limit or 94 miles per hour in a posted 45 zone which is U.S. 20 at Brooklyn Hts.

The average red-light violation was approximately 2.673 seconds. This means the light was red for 2.673 seconds when the vehicle crossed the stop bar prior to entering the intersection. The most flagrant violation was 32.2 seconds which occurred at the intersection of U.S. 20 at State Route 99.

To be considered a red-light violation, the vehicle must have crossed the stop bar after the traffic light has turned red. The stop bar is the very wide white line that is located next to the crosswalk lines, furthest from the intersection. It is not considered a red-light violation if the vehicle is in the intersection when the light turns red. For example, a vehicle stopped in traffic, inside the intersection, to make a left turn would not be considered a red-light violation. Unless there is signage prohibiting, vehicles are permitted to make a right turn on red provided they come to a complete stop first before proceeding safely with the turn.

Speed violations are recorded when a vehicle reaches a speed of 12 mph or higher in a non-school zone area. In school zones a vehicle must be going 10 mph or higher to receive a notice of liability.

Traffic Accidents

In 2022 there were a total of 26 accidents recorded on the highway and on private property. This is up from 19 last year. Part of this can be attributed to increased vehicle traffic with Covid-19 restriction being lifted and people beginning to resume their normal activities including vacation travel. Norwalk Municipal Court- Fines

In 2022 Norwalk Municipal Court assessed \$29,052 in traffic fines as compared to \$19,716 in 2021. In 2021 \$7,860 in fines were assessed for criminal cases as compared to \$7,920 in 2021. Fines for Failure to File Village Income Tax are included in the criminal fine total.
